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MULTIPLEX CHOSEN FOR CONSTRUCTION PHASE



International construction company Multiplex has signed a "Pre-Construction Services Agreement", with the intention that they will deliver the main construction phase of the buildings on the St John's Wood Square site.

Multiplex came out ahead after a strong competition from some of the biggest names in the industry. They stood out thanks to a well-designed construction plan, their commitment to high environmental standards and low impact on the local neighbourhood during the next phase.

Multiplex will be on site and available to meet local residents over the coming months, as they pull together detailed plans for the next stages of the work.

McGee was responsible for the demolition phase and for the piling and basement works. Multiplex will now take on the "shell and core" works. This includes construction of the buildings including staircases, walls and floors, up to the point at which the buildings are "fitted out" with services, kitchens, bathrooms, plastering and electrics.

McGee's team will start handing over competed sections of basement from the end of this year, with Multiplex taking full control of the site in mid 2024. The construction phase will last all the way through to the very end of the project in 2028, and will overlap with the fit out of completed buildings. Most recently in Westminster Borough, Multiplex has been working on the former US Embassy in Grosvenor Square, and the former Met Police Headquarters in Victoria.

Callum Tuckett, Managing Director at Multiplex for the UK, said:

"St John's Wood Square is one of London's most exciting residential developments and we are extremely proud to join the project team and play our part in creating a new community in St John's Wood."

MEET OUR MACHINES: CATERPILLAR CS66B

The Caterpillar CS66B is a "Vibratory Soil Compactor". Its job is to flatten and compact loose ground, working for our contractor McGee. 100 years ago, this job would have been done by a steamroller. 30 years ago it would have been a large diesel-powered roller. The Cs66B does the same job with a much smaller and more efficient vehicle.

The roller on the front of the vehicle is heavy (it weighs 7 tonnes), and the vehicle in total weighs 12.8 tonnes. The machine is fitted with a vibrator which has a maximum centrifugal force of 301 kilonewtons, delivering the same crushing power as a 30-tonne roller – nearly three times the size of this machine.

However in order to reduce vibrations for local residents, at sensitive times and in sensitive locations, the vibrator is turned off, and McGee use the weight of the roller itself to compact the ground, going over the same route several times.

Gulzar Singh is one of the drivers. He says:

"I've been driving heavy plant with McGee for a few years now. Even smaller rollers like the CS66B are still quite large machines, and as an operator, you're seated pretty high up. This gives you a good vantage point to see the area you're working on, but also means you need to be attentive to the surroundings."

"It can be physically demanding as you need to maintain focus and attention for extended periods, as well as deal with vibrations and the motions of the machine."

"It's definitely satisfying to see the results of a solid trail behind you. I love it."

MEET THE TEAM: KISANET MIEBALE, **APPRENTICE CIVIL ENGINEER**

KISANET IS LEARNING WHILE SHE WORKS

What is your job title, and what do you do?

I work as an Apprentice Civil Engineer, where my responsibilities include using engineering equipment, conducting surveys, and contributing to the construction of the permanent structures at St. John's Wood Square.

How did you get the job?

My journey into this field began with a work experience opportunity at McGee. That experience motivated me to apply for an apprenticeship with them. Following an interview, I was fortunate enough to be accepted.

What qualifications do you have, and from where?

I completed my A levels at Harris Academy Bermondsey. As part of my apprenticeship at McGee, I am currently pursuing a Level 3 Civil Engineering Technician program at Westminster College.

What is the best thing about the job?

The best part of this job is its diversity. Every day presents new challenges and opportunities to develop skills while connecting with people from different backgrounds.



What would you say to a young person thinking about a career in this sector?

I encourage any young person considering a career in the construction industry to embrace the variety of opportunities it offers. From architecture, engineering, and project management to skilled trades, there is something for everyone.

It's important to recognise that construction goes beyond building structures. It also involves utilising cutting-edge technology to develop innovative and smart solutions that stand the test of time.

When you are not at work, what do you like to do in your spare time?

SUMMER SCHOOL INSPIRES ARCHITECTS OF TOMORROW

A dozen local young people aged between 12 and 15 took part in a special course over the summer holiday learning about architecture and construction with the St. John's Wood Square team.

The young people from the St. John's Wood area had a four day "Summer School" based at the consultation hub on site, hearing from four of the big companies involved in the project.

Architects from Wilkinson Eyre, Square and Partners, EPR and architect Larry Ng formerly of Pelli Clarke Pelli introduced the young people to the principles and practice of architecture, while a team from McGee took them on-site to learn about construction. At the end of the course, each student presented their own design concept model for the interior of the Riding School

Howard Dawber from St. John's Wood Square said: "It was a packed week for the young people who came up with some brilliant ideas. I am sure that one or two of the students will go on to careers in design or architecture."

We intend to run similar Schools in future holiday periods to give more young people the opportunity to take part.

IT'S OFFICIAL - "ST. JOHN'S WOOD SQUARE NW8"

Westminster City Council has formally approved the use of the name "St John's Wood Square" for the new development.

This is bringing a historical name back into use. There was a "St. John's Wood Square" nearly 200 years ago which was located at the junction of the High Street and Circus Road and appears in the famous Greenwood Map of London in 1827. The name was only used for a few years and the houses on the square became part of St. John's Wood Terrace and Charles Lane.

The name "Square" also evokes memories of the parade square at the heart of the old Barracks.



In the future, we will propose additional names for the individual roads and walkway within the new development, to reflect local history, royal and military connections as well as the high quality of the new development. We look forward to sharing our ideas with local people.

WHAT'S HAPPENING NEXT: SEPTEMBER – DECEMBER 2023

PILING, DIGGING, CONCRETE AND TOWER CRANES

McGee will continue to carry out the piling and basement construction works as our new main contractor Multiplex prepare for the start of the construction phase early next year.

We are more than half-way through the piling programme with over 820 piles in the ground and less than 700 to go (we have increased the number of piles from our original estimate, to support more work around the Riding School). Most of the large piles are now in place.

We are also digging out space where the concrete for the new basement level will be poured. In some locations we have had to use sheet piling to protect the ground from slipping as we install the capping beams for the basement.

Within the next month or so, the first "top down" concrete slabs for the basement levels will be poured. These reinforced slabs will form the ground floor level of each building, and then we will tunnel underneath each slab to create the basement.

We expected the first fixed Tower Crane to arrive in August, but this will now happen in October. This will be a landmark for the project as we move from preparation to construction proper. It will also be the tallest structure around the area.

As we get towards the end of the year we will be putting a protective cage around the historic facade of the remaining buildings at numbers 1 to 7 Queen's Terrace and the corner of Queen's Grove. This will keep the front wall intact as we demolish the rest of the buildings behind.

Finally, we plan to close the site and stop all work for the days over Christmas, to ensure a quiet holiday period for residents.

BUSINESS WHIZZ-KID NOAH HELPS THIRSTY WORKERS -AND RAISES MONEY FOR CHARITY

Noah George may only be 7 years old but he's already thinking up clever ways to make money and help charity.
